

Founded: While native tribes from Venezuela flocked to Aruba as early as 1000 A.D., Europeans did not discover the island until 1499, with the explorations of Amerigo Vespucci and Alonso de Ojeda. After years of colonial rule, it was not until 1986 that Aruba became its own country, although it still remains a Dutch protectorate.

Region: Located in the southern Caribbean, Aruba is 20 miles long (69 square miles) and lies north of Venezuela and east of Colombia.

Population: 103,000 (est. 2009)

Climate: You can rely on the weather in Aruba to be warm, dry, and sunny. Due to a tropical marine climate, temperatures remain stable around a pleasant 82°F. It lies outside the hurricane belt.

Language: Dutch/Papiamento (local dialect)

The 400-foot Antilla is one of the Caribbean's largest shipwrecks and also one of its most popular attractions. It was sunk during World War II and is home to many kinds of exotic sea life.

Baby Natural Bridge

Baby Natural Bridge is a stunning rock and coral formation. The original Natural Bridge fell into the sea in 2005, but the smaller bridge remains a must-see island highlight.

4 Ayo & Casibari Rock Formations

These dramatic formations are shaped by boulders, some the size of small houses

and weighing several tons. Arawak Indians would visit in order to hear incoming thunderstorms and draw on the rocks.

Ostrich Farm

Dozens of extroverted ostriches and emus live at this unusual farm, where you can get an up-close look at the gawky creatures' life cycle and even try hand feeding them!

1 Beaches

Aruba is famous for gorgeous, palm-tree lined white sandy beaches which are home to calm clear waters, making them perfect locations for swimming, snorkeling and sunbathing.

3 Butterfly Farm

Aruba's Butterfly Farm is home to hundreds of exotic butterflies who fly freely within large meshed enclosures. Witness all stages of their life cycle and with guidance, handle these tiny creatures.

8 Underwater Adventure

Ride aboard a semi-sub or submarine, snorkel up to the famed Antilla shipwreck, go scuba diving or try a helmet dive and walk among the colorful fish under the sea.

ARUBA

Known for its stunning beaches, Aruba impresses with treasures both in the sea and on land

With its unbeatable beaches and constant sunshine, it should come as no surprise that Aruba is the most visited island in the Dutch Caribbean.

In the capital of Oranjestad, enjoy the sight of Aruba's colorful markets and impressive Dutch colonial buildings, and find out why the capital has been described as "Holland meets Disney Fantasia." The town is known for its shopping, so make sure to fit in some retail therapy.

Drive through Frenchman's Pass, the legendary passage where 17th century invading French pirates were confronted by native indians. Moving on, visit the picturesque Alto Vista Chapel. This house of worship built by Domingo Antonio Silvestre in 1952 is where Spanish missionaries supposedly converted the island's Indians to Christianity.

Whether you are a family looking for a day of fun and adventure together or a couple seeking to escape the busy public beaches, De Palm Island offers something for everyone. Enjoy snorkeling, swimming, sunbathing and a game of beach volleyball. Your unique 'passport' to the island also includes snorkeling equipment and lessons. Lounge chairs, freshwater showers, complimentary alcoholic beverages and soft drinks are provided, as is a Caribbean buffet meal.

Stunning shores

Most of Aruba's visitors come seeking one thing: its legendary beaches. Palm Beach, with its white sand and blue water, has made countless magazine "best beaches of the world" lists. If you want to do more than just kick back and sunbathe, recreational options here also include sailing and fishing. Some of the hotels are separated from the beach by flowering gardens, which are striking with the bright colors of their lush vegetation, since the island is so dry.

In addition to Palm Beach, the Turquoise Coast (which runs along Aruba's western and southern beaches) is also home to the quieter Eagle Beach, further away from the hotel zone.

Tales below the sea

While Aruba's beaches are perhaps its biggest draw, various sights in the area paint a picture of the history of the surrounding waters. The California Lighthouse is named after the steamship *California*, which sank off the coast of Aruba in 1891, but the legacy lives on in this silent sentry. From the lighthouse, you will have plenty of time to admire stunning island views.

The Antilla sank during World War II and is one of the Caribbean's largest shipwrecks. It lies at a depth of 55 feet, and the parts of it that can readily be seen from the surface are often home to resting pelicans. The wreck attracts hundreds of

breeds of striking tropical fish, while many parts of the ship are overgrown with sponges and other marine plants.

If you take the plunge in the *Atlantis* submarine, you will have the chance to view fascinating coral formations, a mysterious sunken airplane, or the newly sunken coaster *Morgenster* up close. You will also discover the many colorful fish that inhabit these waters.

Hidden inland gems

Aruba is known for its crystal blue waters and white-sand beaches, but you should also visit the island's "cunucu," or unspoiled countryside—perhaps by heading to a local ranch to explore by horseback in true cowboy style. You can also visit the dramatic Casibari Rock formations, which are a shrub-covered landscape shaped by boulders, some the size and weight of small houses.

Heading to the north coast, you will be able to explore one of Aruba's most popular sights, the sea-worn Natural Bridge that collapsed in 2005, and the still intact Baby Natural Bridge, an arch carved out of rock and coral. You can visit the informative Ostrich Farm and learn about these amazing creatures. Wildlife lovers should also stop by the tropical gardens of the Butterfly Farm, where you can view hundreds of exotic butterflies flying freely within large meshed enclosures, and witness all stages of their life cycle.

While any trip to Aruba should naturally be spent on its spectacular beaches, make time to explore underwater and inland gems as well.

™ DID YOU KNOW?

Local cuisine

Some of the best and most diverse in the Caribbean, the cuisine is mostly influenced by the Netherlands and other parts of Europe, South America, and the Caribbean itself. Try pan bati (a pancake-like bread) or keshi yena (a baked medley of Gouda cheese, spices, and meat with a heavy brown sauce). Popular seafood options include red snapper, mahi mahi and grouper.

No construction zone

Aruba remains safe from overdevelopment, as a moratorium on new hotel construction in the past decade has limited new resorts from coming up.

The party season

The highlight of Aruba's winter season is Carnival, which takes place in January and February. Revelers enjoy song and dance, parades, and costumes.

De Palm Island

Just a 5-minute boat ride from the mainland, this attraction features various water sports including helmet diving and snorkeling.

Take the plunge

Stay dry when you board the Atlantis submarine. It's the real thing, diving about 100 feet below the surface.

Nature's guide


The island's trademark bent-over divi-divi trees are a natural compass as they only ever point in a southwesterly direction due to the trade winds.

Post Office: There is a post office located in the Royal Plaza Mall. Hours are generally from 8:00am to 3:00pm Monday to Friday.



Old City

The walled historic center of Cartagena is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Its winding streets lined with Spanish Colonial architecture display colorfully painted buildings, local bars and restaurants.

2 Las Murallas

Considered by many the most impressive city walls in the world, Las Murallas began construction after an attack by Sir Francis Drake at the end of the 16th century.

3 Castillo de San Felipe de Barajas

Majestically standing guard on a hillside overlooking the city and harbor is Castillo de San Felipe, a fortress built by the Spanish for protection against pirates while shipping gold out to Europe.

4 Historical Museum of

Cartagena

Behind a charming, colonial facade, the palace museum displays instruments of torture from the Spanish Inquisition, pre-Columbian, colonial and independence-era art.

6 Cartagena's Cathedral

The cathedral is one of the largest in a series of fortresses with a massive exterior and simple interior. Partially demolished by Sir Francis Drake's cannons, it was completed in 1602.

6 Museo de Oro y Arqueloguía

Gold and pottery collections of the Tayrona, Calima and Sinú people are on display, as well as panel exhibitions about the Atlantic coast cultures.

La Popa Monastery

Built atop a hill, this 17th-century monastery features a chapel, a colonial museum and a spectacular view of the city, and remains inhabited by monks even today.

1 Folkloric Show

This presentation of music and dance takes place at the historic Heredia Theater. Five distinct dances from three important regions of Colombia are performed by a professional dance company.

Las Bóvedas

Inside the Old City are Las Bóvedas, dungeons initially built for military purposes, now home to boutiques and tourist shops.

10 Jewelry Making

Discover the fascinating history behind Colombian emeralds while learning the tools and techniques of handcrafting a stunning sterling silver ring, pendant, bracelet or earrings.

CARTAGENA

Spanish colonial charms in South America

This vibrant city harbors a fascinating and colorful past, which can be seen along its cobblestone streets, in its Spanish colonial homes with wood-beamed balconies and stone towers, and its impressive salt-bleached stone walls. Your journey here will provide you with a significant link to the region's grand past.

Bounty of the sea

There have been a variety of indigenous peoples living along Cartagena's coastline from the pre-Columbian period including the Caribe warriors. With European expansion into the New World in the 15th century, it was just a matter of time before this coastal region would be discovered. In 1501, while mapping South America, Spanish conquistador Rodrigo de Bastidas sailed into the bay but it wasn't until 1533 that a permanent settlement was established by Don Pedro de Heredia, who named it Cartagena de Indias (pronounced Carta-hay-na).

The town grew rapidly as a shipping center for gold, silver and slaves between the Americas and Spain. Because of the rich cargos, Cartagena became a favorite target of pirates.

After more than 250 years as part of the Spanish Crown, Cartagena declared its independence in 1811, and today enjoys its reputation as a city so rich in history it's been declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Pirates of the Spanish Main

Like many successful Spanish ports, Cartagena was a prime target for English and French pirates. One of the most notorious to venture into Cartagena's beautiful bay was Sir Francis Drake who attacked the city in 1586. After destroying one-quarter of

its buildings, including the Cartagena Cathedral, he demanded a ransom – 107,000 Spanish Eight Reales, which, in today's dollars is around \$200 million.

The city recovered but after repeated attacks and severe looting by both British and French invaders Spain decided to pour all its resources (estimated to be around two trillion dollars) into constructing gigantic fortresses, which made Cartagena an impregnable stronghold.

Standing guard

In response to invaders, the Spaniards built huge stonewall fortifications around the city. Declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site for its "eminent example of the military architecture of the 16th, 17th and 18th centuries," Cartagena's fortresses are "the most extensive in the New World and the most complete." This area is comprised of three sections – the Centro, where most of the historic buildings are located; San Diego, home to the city's merchant class, and La Matuna, the commercial and financial heart of the city.

In the city's Centro section, you'll find the magnificent fortress known as the Castillo de San Felipe de Barajas. Built between 1536 and 1657, it stands as the largest Spanish fort ever built in the New World. A must-see is the tunnel system meant to facilitate supplies and the fortress' evacuation.

Testaments to good and evil

The Inquisition that had gripped Spain during the Middle Ages expanded to all Spanish colonies and territories including Colombia. While churches were built in Cartagena to bless the faithful, "courts" were erected to seek out, try and condemn anyone viewed as a heretic.

The Historical Museum of Cartagena is a charming multistoried structure and the best example of 18th century colonial Spanish architecture. But behind the ornate stone gateway is a history of misery and torture. During the colonial era, 800 people were condemned to death and executed for crimes of what the Church decreed were "magic, witchcraft and blasphemy." The museum inside displays instruments of torture, as well as pre-Columbia, colonial and independence-era art.

Another interesting site in the Old City is the Heredia Theater, built in 1911 as part of the country's centennial celebration of its independence. It was reconstructed in 1998 and now hosts a folkloric presentation as part of tour CTG-200.

Vivid reminders of Spain's hold on Cartagena are easily found around every corner of this city. But it's also a bustling city that, while, embracing its past, is eager to show you to its multifaceted sides.

DID YOU KNOW?

Local cuisine

The cuisine of Colombia is as diverse as the culture of Colombia, due to the influences from Spain, Italy and France along with American cuisine, Caribbean influences and the traditional style of the Native Americans. Local specialties to try include buñuelos, which are deep fried corn flour balls with cheese in the dough, and empanadas, made with potato and meat with a pouch-like yellow exterior.

Precious fact

95% of the world's emeralds come from Colombia.

How many countries?

South America has 13 countries.

From sea to shining sea

Colombia is the only South American country with coastlines on both the Pacific Ocean and Caribbean Sea.

What's in a name?

Citizens of Cartagena are called Cartageneros.

Tasty taters

Pre-Columbian civilizations cultivated about 200 varieties of potatoes and Cartageneros know how to prepare them hundreds of different and delicious ways. Two tasty preparations you may like are "papas saladas" (salted potatoes) and "papas chorriadas" (stewed potatoes).

Drink up

Agua de panela is a drink prepared with panela (dried cane juice), and mixed with cinnamon and cloves. Colombia's national alcoholic beverage, aguardiente, tastes like anise. Around 12% of the world's coffee is produced in Colombia.

Floral fact

Colombia is the second largest fresh cut flower exporter in the world.

Manners matter

Colombians are very formal so be sure to always say "por favor" and "muchas gracias."

Name game

The name Colombia was derived from Christopher Columbus. The name underwent few changes until finally, the name Republic of Colombia was adopted in 1886.

Sordid reminder

Cartagena was the center for slave trade during the colony era. Many slaves, after arriving from Africa, would be sold to work in the silver mines of Peru or Panama's sugarcane plantations. Inside the main entrance of the Old City is the Plaza de los Coches, the original location of the slave market.

You don't say

Only Mexico and Spain have more Spanish-speaking citizens than Colombia.

Extreme ecosystems

Colombia is one of only 17 of the most biodiverse places on earth. The country not only encompasses the Andes Mountains but the Pacific and Caribbean coastlines, tropical grasslands and the Amazon rainforest.

There is a modern cruise ship terminal located here, complete with a large souvenir shop, an interesting walk-through emerald exhibit, telephones, and refreshment kiosk.

Proper Attire: The weather is consistently warm. A light shirt, short and a long sleeved for the occasional cool evening.

Transportation: Tour buses park right by the gangway. For independent travelers, there is a complimentary shuttle (or you can safely walk) to the cruise terminal. From the terminal a brigade of yellow taxis await. Be specific about where you want to go. Confirm fare before departing. Varying degrees of English are spoken. The drive to the walled city takes about 10–15 minutes.

Shopping: The dollar is widely accepted. There are two main areas to shop: the recommended stores are mostly located at Pierino Gallo Shopping Center in Bocagrande, the residential and newer part of the city. See an amzing selection of emeralds here. Las Bóvedas is filled with arts and crafts, housed in former jail cells of this historic structure. Stores are open while ships are in port.

Tipping: In most restaurants, a 10 percent service charge is normally added to your bill.

Banks: Hours vary by branch. HSBC Bank in the Old City is generally open from 9:00am to 12:30pm and 2:30pm to 4:30pm. Monday through Friday. Post Office: Hours are Monday through Friday 9:00am to 12:00pm, and 2:00pm to 4:00pm.

Founded: Pre-Columbian populations are known to have inhabited Panama as far back as 11,000 years ago. King Charles V of Spain authorized a survey of the region in 1534.


Region: The Isthmus is a land bridge connecting North and South America.

Population: 3.4 million (est. 2010) with about 12 million in the Panama City metro area. The population of Colón is 204,000 (est. 2000).

Climate: Situated between seven and nine degrees north of the equator, Panama's temperatures vary little from month to month. Enjoying a tropical climate, Panama experiences daytime temperatures from 80°F to 90°F. The rainy season occurs April through December, but showers are often followed by sunshine.

Language: Spanish, although English is widely spoken.

Currency: U.S. Dollar (USD)

The epic sea change

It would be an understatement to say that the Panama Canal is one of the great engineering feats of the 20th century, managing to do what nature forgot to do – connecting the Atlantic to the Pacific, reducing the 12,000-mile sailing distance between New York and San Francisco by more than 7,800 miles.

The discovery

A must-see destination on every traveler's list, the Panama Canal opened in 1914, fulfilling a dream 400 years in the making. The 51-mile route cuts through sheer granite and dense jungle, creating a vital trade route linking the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. More than 1 million ships have traveled through the canal's intricate lock system, one of the most challenging engineering projects ever undertaken.

Gatun Locks are the first set of locks on the Atlantic side. The three-step process lifts the ship 85 feet above sea level and into Gatun Lake.

A complete transit to the Pacific would include two more sets of locks. The Pedro Miguel Locks step down 31 feet and Miraflores Locks has two more steps down, lowering vessels another 58 feet. The gates for this set of locks is the largest and tallest due to fluctuating tides.


Explore in style

An eco-cruise along tranquil Gatun Lake takes you through a labyrinth of verdant islands that are home to an abundance of wildlife and the famed Monkey Island, named for its playful inhabitants. The two species most often seen are the howler monkey and the capuchin monkey, equally adorable and mischievous.

Extraordinary scenery flanks the Panama Canal, and thrilling views can be captured aboard the historic Panama Canal Railway. Originally built in 1855, it was the first transcontinental railroad ever constructed. It follows a picturesque path across the Isthmus of Panama, past the canal's locks, magnificent Gaillard Cut, and the slender causeways in Gatun Lake.

Prefer a bird's eye view of this incredible landscape? Then climb aboard an aerial tram ride that takes you 280 feet above the rainforest floor. A naturalist accompanies guests on this scenic journey, and a stop at the observation tower affords splendid views of Soberania National Park.

Established in 1980, Soberania National Park borders much of the eastern side of the canal. Home to 105 species of mammals and over 525 different species of birds, the Camino de Cruces that crosses through the park is an actual road that the Spanish used to transport gold overland from the Pacific to their ships in the Caribbean.

Stroll through history

It was on Panamanian soil that Spain founded its first city on solid ground. Panama la Vieja (Old Panama) grew rapidly from its establishment in 1519. It maintained a position as chief post of the Pacific, and through it passed treasures from the mines of Peru and the pearl fisheries in the Bay of Panama. Although the city survived a series of devastating fires, it was ultimately destroyed by pirates lead by buccaneer Sir Henry Morgan.

Casco Viejo replaced the city in the same year, and although the location had changed, it preserved the original street plan. The architecture is an unusual mixture of Spanish, French and early American styles, and the Colonial-era center is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. This charming district is home to several monuments and museums and is wisely protected by a sea wall erected to guard against pirate attacks. A stroll atop this wall affords breathtaking Pacific Ocean views.

Cultural expression

To really experience the origins of Panama, travel further back in time and into the jungles of Chagres, where a traditional Embera Indian Village waits to be discovered. The Embera are an indigenous tribe, and daily life here is much as it was centuries ago. Tribal members welcome you to their authentic homes, and proudly display their original handicrafts.

Panama uniquely blends natural splendor and a strong cultural history with one of the greatest man-made marvels of concrete and steel. Yet this diverging heritage produces adventure, excitement and beauty to those who visit its shores.

DID YOU KNOW?

Local cuisine

Everything from French and Italian to Chinese and Middle Eastern is available. Traditional Panamanian cooking borrows from the Caribbean and Spain and incorporates many indigenous vegetables, fruits and herbs.

Building blocks

The most expansive man-made project ever undertaken was the construction of the Panama Canal. It took more than 34 years to complete and cost the lives of over 27,000 people, who died from either tropical diseases or landslides.

Colorful canvas

The Canal Administration Building was built in 1914. Four magnificent murals depicting the heroism exhibited during the building of the canal surround its beautiful glass cupola. They were painted by William B. Van Ingen, who also did murals for the U.S. Mint in Philadelphia and the Library of Congress in Washington.

About the railway

The Panama Canal Railway was built across the isthmus from 1850 to 1855, running 47 miles from Colón, on the Atlantic Coast, to Panama City on the Pacific side.

Mark your calendar

The anniversary of the opening of the Panama Canal on August 15, 1914, coincides with the anniversary of the founding of Old Panama on August 15, 1519.

Hats off

The Panama hat isn't made in Panama at all. It originated in Ecuador but was worn by the balding Ferdinand de Lesseps during the building of the canal. They were then imported from Ecuador to be used by the thousands of canal workers to protect them from the intense tropical sun.

Snow cone

Panamanians love snow cones, known as raspadors. Vendors scrape shavings of ice into a cone and add a dash of fruit flavors and a squirt of condensed milk or honey. Refreshing!

The city of Colón

The city was founded by Americans in 1850 as the Atlantic terminus of the Panama Canal Railroad, which was under construction to meet the gold rush demand for a fast route to California.

Residential streets

In Panama City, most residential streets either have no name or three different ones! Some say that's the reason that Panama City never developed a postal delivery system. Residents have post office boxes, called apartados.

Souvenir shopping

Replicas of huacas, traditional objects made before the arrival of the Spanish, convey spiritual meaning and are popular mementos from Panama. They can be purchased in various materials from clay to gold.

Pipeline Road

Pipeline Road is a superstar among the Audubon Society. In just one day in 1996, 525 species of birds were recorded!

Tropical studies

What began as a small field station in the Panama Canal Zone in 1923 has developed into The Smithsonian Tropical Research Institution, one of the leading research centers in the world specializing in biological diversity and visited by 1,000 scientists from around the world each year.

First transit

The cargo ship *Ancon* was the first vessel to officially pass through the Panama Canal on August 15, 1914. By using the canal, 7,800 miles is cut off of a journey from New York to San Francisco.



Waiting to be discovered

So many are drawn to this picturesque coastal village. Is it the flourishing rainforest, beautiful beaches and protected wildlife refuges? Or could it be the endless variety of excursions? Whether you're a first time visitor or a frequent guest, you're sure to find something new and exciting around every corner.

True measure of wealth

Columbus landed near Limón (Spanish, for lemon) in 1502 on his fourth and final voyage to the New World but the "Rich Coast" never lived up to the promise of gold or other riches like its neighboring Spanish colonies.


Pirates, however, believed that the conquistadors hadn't fully explored inland. In 1640, an army, led by the famous buccaneer Henry Morgan, dropped anchor in Portete, a small bay near Limón, and proceeded to march to Cartago in hopes of hauling away a large amount of booty. However, they only found angry town citizens and country folk who beat them back to Limón. If Morgan had arrived about 200 years later, he would have discovered Limon's true wealth – pineapples, bananas and cocoa.

Thousands of former Jamaican slaves arrived in 1871 to build a railroad linking Limón with the coffee plantations of the country's Central Valley for European export. Their descendants firmly established a colorful community here and as you walk through the streets of Limón, you can see this Afro-Caribbean influence in the city's architecture, food and festivals.

Plantations

Ever wonder how your Tres Rios Costa Rica Belle Vista grande, no fat, thick foam, wet cap makes its way to your cup? Take a tour of a coffee factory. Nestled in a lush valley, surrounded by beautiful rainforest and mountains, excursions to the nearly century-old Grano de Oro (Golden Bean) coffee factory begin with a fascinating blend of scenic wonder and education, and end with a tasty cup of coffee.

In addition to coffee, banana plantations also dot the landscape. Not only is Costa Rica one of the largest banana producers in the world but 80% of the plantations are located here in Limón province. For those interested in learning more about this tropical fruit, tours offer a close-up look into the harvesting and packing operations.

Up, up and away

Experience the lush and verdant rainforest by soaring through the canopy by zipline or gliding in an open-air gondola. Each exciting jungle adventure offers possible wildlife sightings, so be on the lookout for monkeys and the many species of birds that live in this spectacular environment.

But you don't have to whiz through the treetops to enjoy the rainforest's beauty. For a different point of view, take a leisurely pontoon boat ride along the Tortuguero Canals, which travels through the lowland rainforest. Hailed as Costa Rica's Amazon, the canals are home to sloths, white-faced spider monkeys and howler monkeys, crocodiles, many waterfowl species, and if you're lucky, you may see an endangered West Indian Manatee.

Take a walk on the wild side

Learn about the life and habitat of the sloth on a tour of the Aviarios del Caribe Sloth Sanctuary Rescue Center. This non-profit sanctuary and research facility is dedicated to the rescue of this slow-moving mammal. Not only will you meet several sloths, but a canoe trip down the Estrella River offers an opportunity to spot monkeys, bats, river otters, anteaters and even manatees, tapirs and macaws!

Buried deep in the forest of Costa Rica is the Veragua Rainforest, a world-class facility and adventure park designed to enlighten the wonders of biodiversity. It's also a world of fun – ride through the rainforest canopy on an open-air gondola, stand next to a pristine waterfall, enter the only frog exhibit of its kind in the world, marvel at hundreds of butterflies, and stroll through a hummingbird garden.

Exotic animals, adventures and miles of untamed jungle, Limón is the gateway to relaxation, fun and discovery.

DID YOU KNOW?

Local cuisine

Try the national dish of Costa Rica, which is "gallo pinto," rice and beans fried together with onions, peppers, cilantro and more.

Sweet stuff

Fruits such as papaya, pineapple, melon, banana and carambola (star fruit) are abundant and eaten any time of the day but sweet confections like tres leche cake, which is similar to a pound cake, and flan, a very creamy custard topped with caramel sauce, are a very popular way to end a meal.

Welcoming waterway

Tortuguero National Park is sometimes called the Amazon of Costa Rica for the series of rivers and canals that connect Limón to the rest of the country's mainland. This extensive network of waterways is home to seven species of river turtles, otters, a number of crustaceans, and over 50 species of freshwater fish.

Long time to brew

It takes four years for a coffee bush to mature; only then can the beans be picked.

Raindrops keep falling on your head

More than 200 inches of rain falls in Costa Rica each year so don't be surprised of you're caught in a sudden downpour.

Crazy for caffeine

Costa Rica became the first Central American country to grow and export coffee.

Top heavy

Two-thirds of Costa Rica's species live in the canopy of its rainforests.

Size doesn't matter

At a little over 19,729 square miles, Costa Rica is slightly smaller than West Virginia.

Namesake

Costa Ricans refer to themselves as "ticos" (males) or "ticas" (females).

Free government

Costa Rica is the oldest democracy in Latin America.

Peaceful intentions

Costa Rica is the only country in the Western Hemisphere without an army or military of any kind. Costa Rica prides itself on being the "Land of Peace" as they have had over 100 years of political stability.

Eco-friendly

Costa Rica is among the countries with the highest amount of protected land in the world; 25% of the national territory is dedicated to the national park system or biological, marine and land reserves, as well as other natural wildlife areas.

Monkey business

Four types of monkeys live in the national parks and other protected areas so be on the lookout for these exotic primates:

- Covered in long, thick black, brown or red hair, the shrieks of the howler monkey can be heard up to three miles.
- Spider monkeys have long, lanky arms and gripping tails that allow them to move gracefully from branch to branch and tree to tree.
- The cute white-headed capuchin has a black coat, a pink face, and measures around 15 inches tall.
- The smallest monkey in the Caribbean jungle is the squirrel monkey. Measuring a mere nine to 13 inches, this cute creature is captured and sold as a pet.




Costa Rica is a land of great variety: Majestic mountains (some as high as 13,000 feet), fertile pasturelands, lush rainforests and

History

Costa Rica was sighted by Christopher Columbus in 1502, when he landed near Puerto Limón on the Atlantic shore. Believing he had discovered a land of vast wealth, he named it "Costa Rica," which means "Rich Coast." Unlike other parts of Central America, the colonization was relatively bloodless. The local inhabitants were mainly peaceful Indian farmers whose numbers were eventually depleted when introduced to European disease.

The first capital city was Cartago, founded in 1563. Eventually, the capital was moved West to San Jose in 1737. Independence from Spain was declared in 1821, beginning a period of civil war between the Liberal and Conservative factions.

After independence, the government anxiously sought goods that could be exported and taxed for revenue. Coffee, which had been introduced from Cuba, was the answer. The government offered free land to coffee growers, thus building a landowning class. The prosperity brought by coffee exportation since the 1850's resulted in and settlement expansion.

Costa Rica's long tradition of democracy began in 1889 and has continued to the present day. The only lapse in this record was in 1948, when the constitution was abolished and a military dictatorship took over. One year later, a new constitution was adopted and the army was permanently abolished. In 1983, the country made an official proclamation of neutrality.

Costa Rica today is a model of democracy and political stability. It boasts a fine health care system, telecommunications network and school systems with one of the highest literacy rates in the world - 92 percent.

Capital

San José is the capital of Costa Rica.

Location

Costa Rica is in the Central American Isthmas, with Nicaragua to the north and Panama to the south. It is flanked by the Pacific Ocean and the Caribbean.

The land area is about the size of West Virginia; a little under 20 thousand square miles. From north to south. Costa Rica stretches 275 miles.

About 4.5 million people live in Costa Rica, including a number of Americans.

Spanish is the official language.

Many Costa Ricans speak English and French.

The official currency is the "colon." The United States dollar, credit cards and travelers checks are widely accepted.

Costa Rica is on United States Central Standard Time. The ship may not always follow local time. Please adhere to the ship's time while in port.

Docking/Tendering

The ship docks in Puerto Limón on the Caribbean Sea.





OCHO RIOS

The fragrant blossoms of this "Garden Parish" welcome you to paradise

It is not surprising that when Columbus landed more than 500 years ago on what would become Ocho Rios he exclaimed, "It is the fairest island ever eyes beheld." Nestled in the heart of Jamaica's North Coast region, its magnificent flora, cascading waterfalls, and sun-swept beaches define Ocho Rios' legendary beauty.

The origin of the name "Ocho Rios" remains a bit of a mystery. Directly translated from the Spanish, it means "eight rivers," but since there are not eight rivers, it is more likely the name derived from the words "las chorreras" (the spouts), a name given to the village because of the nearby waterfalls.

Wet and wild


One of Jamaica's national treasures, Dunn's River Falls is Ocho Rios' most beloved attraction. A dramatic 600-foot drop of cascading water dominates a tranquil rainforest setting. The falls are a living phenomenon, as they continually regenerate themselves with deposits of travertine from the river that cling to the falls, replenishing the rocks. A climb up its limestone tiers and a swim in the sparkling pools is a delight; although, a walkway built into the forest environment allows you to experience the spectacle without getting wet.

You won't be able to keep your hair dry at Dolphin Cove because these adorable mammals are known to splash! Enjoy an encounter with gentle bottlenose dolphins and play, touch and swim with these intelligent creatures in their natural home. This happy family has a scenic and safe setting — perhaps drawn to the sounds of the steel band that perform along the boardwalk or the chatter of the animals and reptiles that can be found on the adjacent Jungle Trail.

Emerald forests

Mother Nature takes center stage again at the Coyaba River Gardens and Museum. The word coyaba is derived from the Arawak word for "paradise," and this tropical, leafy setting does not disappoint. A landscaped park surrounds a museum showcasing a collection of artifacts from the Arawak, Spanish and colonial English settlements in the area.

Looking for even more thrilling ways to appreciate Ocho Rios' natural beauty? Mystic Mountain is a rainforest adventure park with a dizzying array of eco-friendly and heart-pounding attractions. Travel on a rainforest chairlift that takes you from the shore to 700 feet above sea level for mountaintop views. The ride up is serene and scenic. There is a restaurant, infinity pool, waterslide and bobsled ride at the top.

Plantation heritage

The varied climate conditions of Ocho Rios make it suitable for agricultural crops. Prospect Plantation, a working property established in the 18th century is the perfect place to discover the island's bounty.

Beginning in 1936, Prospect produced pimentos, allspice and limes and was overseen by its Scotland-born owner, Sir Harold Mitchell. After his death in 1983, the 1,000 acres were transformed into an eco-destination to inspire visitors and offer a true Jamaican plantation experience.

Creative culture

Another restored property that highlights Jamaican culture is the beautiful mid-1800s mansion, Harmony Hall, which proudly displays the work of more than 100 artists and craftsmen on the upper floor while chefs artfully confect Italian cuisine in the restaurant below.

Ocho Rios' cultural expression can also be found at Wassi Art pottery. Pronounced "wha-see," in the ancient Jamaican dialect it means "terrific, stinging like a wasp," which aptly describes both the quality of art and the piercing vision the young Jamaican artists bring to their work. Bold and beautiful creations are on display, each a cherished island treasure.

The coloration and design of its native artwork reflect Ocho Rios' natural palate. Discover a canvas of green rolling hills, aquamarine waterfalls and a burst of rainbow-hued flowers when you grace Ocho Rios' breathtaking shores.

™ DID YOU KNOW?

Local cuisine

Try the island's unique blend of spices, recipes and flavors, blending the island's tropical bounty with the area's multicultural heritage. This includes ackee and saltfish for breakfast, and lunch or dinner dishes such as jerk, with its marinated meat with a fiery blend of spices, served up with even more hot sauce and the "Coat of Arms" of Jamaica - rice and peas.

Nickname

Ocho Rios is affectionately called "Ochi" by the locals.

Reggae, man

Ocho Rios is both the birthplace and burial site of famed reggae singer Bob Marley.

Shaken, not stirred

Ocho Rios was featured in the very first James Bond film, *Dr. No*, released in 1962. The town was the home of Bond's adversary, Miss Taro, who was in alliance with the villainous Dr. Julius No.

Secret location

James Bond Beach is situated east of Ocho Rios and is a popular attraction for visitors.

High spirits

English playwright Sir Noel Coward's Ocho Rios burial site and hilltop estate is called Firefly. Built in 1941, it served as his studio and was host to the last British Empress of India, Queen Elizabeth I, and her daughter, Queen Elizabeth II.

The name's the thing

Ian Fleming, the creator of the James Bond series, named his home in Ocho Rios Goldeneye, after a birdwatcher and author of the *Birds of West Indies*. It later became the title of one of his books.

A taste of the island

Escovitch is a style of cooking brought to Jamaica by the Spanish that uses vinegar, onions and spices. You can bring this taste of the island home with you by purchasing bottled escovitch sauce in Jamaican grocery stores.

Hats off!

The Ocho Rios Craft Park is home to over 100 vendors and stalls. Here, an artisan will weave a hat or a basket for you right before your eyes!

Sip and savor

The classic Jamaican cocktail, the hummingbird, is a creamy blend of coffee liqueur, rum cream liqueur, milk, strawberry syrup and bananas, whipped with ice to a frosty consistency.

Green thumbs

While strolling the grounds of Prospect Plantation, small plaques mark which trees were planted by visiting guests. Look for Charlie Chaplin, Winston Churchill, Noel Coward and Henry Kissinger among other historic notables, as well as the modern movie star Drew Barrymore.

Nature's flower shop

A profusion of indigenous plants and glorious coastal views can be found at Shaw Park Gardens. Over 600 species of flowers can be found on this 35-acre estate, which offers rich local flora and captivating mountaintop views.

Blue Mountain coffee

This is one of the most expensive and soughtafter coffees in the world; over 80% is exported to Japan.




